

The present holders of the trophy are The Platters.





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Kings Arms

Welcome to our community pub on the South Devon coast.



There's no way of sugar coating it, it's been a difficult period for our community pub but hopefully there

is now light at the end of the tunnel.

Put simply the problems have been:

- 1. Lack of footfall not enough people have been using the pub. This has declined this year.
- 2. Not enough people have been volunteering.
- 3. Despite some improvements in managing costs, the pub continues to make a loss.

Which is why at the AGM on November 17th, the committee proposed that we had to accept that whilst the pub was to be run with commercial discipline it was now clear that it would require ongoing community support.

This is why a subscription model has been recommended, something that for a relatively low cost each month can provide ongoing support, thus avoiding an annual crisis. The logic is covered in the slide alongside this article. This would dramatically improve planning and increase the chances of the pub surviving for the long-term. As you will see from the Chair's letter, this proposal was supported by shareholders (letter also printed alongside). Many people have already subscribed but more are needed —

so, if you can, please sign up. Since the AGM, a number of new volunteers have stepped up. But more are needed. The committee is too small to do all the things that need to be done. More people are needed to work front of house: this is key to profitability. Robin Staunton and Lisa Lyne are taking this on. The plan is to take a different approach to re-energise this area. If you are interested, please get in touch.

In terms of footfall, next year we plan to do more, more often and with greater variety - *if* we can get the support. In the meantime, there is lots to do in December.

Christmas Fayre Saturday 30th November 10am to 4pm. A chance to pick up something unique this Christmas, with a range of artisan and homemade gifts from a selection of stall holders.

Sunday Roasts, Carols & Tree Lighting Sunday 1st December. Sunday Roasts continue to get rave reviews despite changes in the kitchen. The Case for Community Subscription

The Challenge We Face

Tumover dropped, especially over a very poor summer, which saw a year-on-year drop in surnover of £26k. Despite improving margins and gross profit, the bottom-line gap for the year is likely to be £45k. It has been in the £40ks for the last 3 years, so there

The traditional business model has proved unsustainable, so we must think differently.

An unconventional business

The Committee now recognises that the pub cannot confinue as a conventional business, at least for now - it needs to be supported by the community.

Yes, margins can continue to improve, and yes, grants and fundraising events can help boost fundraising that he gap is too significant to be closed by these measures alone.

We have searched for large benefactors from local businesses but have not found any.

We must look to the community to agree a means to ensure the long-term survival of the pub.

The Subscription Solution

We have introduced a subscription scheme based upon a simple model that if 200 people subscribe at £20 a month, the gap can be plessed. This means people pay a relatively small amount on an ongoing basis (£20 per month being less than Sky or two coffees a week, Jer some, this will be largely invisible, and for all certainly less painful as it spreads the cost over time as opposed to a lump sum donation.

For the pub, a subscription scheme brings

- Much greater predictability of income, enabling better planning, more accurate budgeting and forecasting, and it creates a financial buffer for unexpected expenses - something that doesn't exist today.
- Long-term stability, helping to secure the pub's future beyond short-term fundraising, makes staff retention easier given nnreased security, and possibly enables better negotiation with suppliers.

The subscription solution also has the benefit of being easier to manage than repeated fundraising campaigns, which have proved difficult to progress, as the Committee needs more members to



Results of the Shareholder Resolution November 2024

Dear Shareholders, subscribers and supporters,

We are writing to inform you of the results of the Shareholder Resolution following Sunday's AGM regarding the future of our community pub. The vote showed overwhelming support for keeping the pub open, with:

- 112 shareholders voting in favour (96.6%)
- · 4 shareholders voting against (3.4%)
- Total votes cast: 116

We thank all shareholders who participated in this crucial vote. This strong mandate supports the Committee's plan, with improvements, to ensure the pub's future viability through increased subscriptions, the introduction of a form of discount/loyalty card scheme, volunteering initiatives, and operational improvements, as outlined in the resolution.

The Committee asks <u>everyone</u> who has pledged funds to ensure that standing orders are set up and donations paid to maintain operations through the Winter months. Our current cash position is critical for meeting November and December obligations, in particular.

If you haven't yet pledged to subscribe, maybe you will now do so, if you can, and if you have pledged one amount, could you perhaps consider increasing it?

If you are able, will you consider volunteering? This could be in a wide variety of ways and we will hold a number of events shortly when you can explore this in more detail. Please contact lisa.lyne@kingsarmsatstrete.co.uk in the first instance.

For its part, the Committee will proceed with implementing the proposed plan, including:

- Developing with urgency a new discount/loyalty scheme for subscribers, with the help of those who expressed persuasive ideas at the AGM.
- Organising volunteer recruitment events.
- Enhancing our communication and engagement with shareholders, subscribers and the community generally, including updates on these initiatives.

Whilst we have not yet achieved our target of raising £48k in new subscriptions to bring lasting sustainability to the pub, we have moved closer from a position at the AGM of 54% to 68% pledged for this year.

Together, we are making progress, and with a more viable business model that combines subscriptions with a form of discount or loyalty card, and associated pricing strategy, we are confident that the pub will attract more customers and more subscribers and can stay open for the foreseeable future.

We are delighted that the Kings Arms will be open for us all to celebrate Christmas, and it will be a happy New Year!



Festive Treats

Macaroons

Ingredients:

50g ground almonds

50g caster sugar

1 tbsp cornflour

1/2 tsp almond essence

1 egg white

15 flaked almonds

4 glace cherries

icing sugar to dust



Preheat the oven 160c. Line 2 baking sheets with non-stick baking paper Place the ground almonds, sugar, cornflour and almond essence into a bowl and mix well using a wooden spoon.

Stir in just enough eggwhite to form a soft piping consistency. Place into a piping bag a 1cm nozzle, pipe the mixture on to each baking sheet, spaced well apart. Press a flaked almond on half the macaroons and glace cherries on the remainder.

Bake for 10 - 15 minutes.

Cinnamon Crisps

Ingredients:

125g wholewheat flour

50g rolled oats

75g sugar

1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda

1 tsp ground cinnamon

75g butter

1 tbsp golden syrup

1 tbsp milk



Place the flour, oats and sugar in a bowl, sift in the soda and cinnamon and mix thoroughly.

Place the butter, syrup and milk in a pan and heat until the butter has melted. Pour into the dry ingredients and beat until smooth.

Shape into small balls and place slightly apart on a greased baking sheet and flatten with a palette knife.

Bake in a preheated oven 180c for 15 minutes until golden brown. Cool on the baking sheet.



Mini Hasselback Potatoes Ingredients: 20 small new potatoes 1/4 cup unsalted butter 2 garlic cloves crushed 1 ½ cups grated cheddar salt and pepper

3 tablespoons thinly sliced chives

Preheat the oven 200c. Place the potatoes between two chop sticks and make cuts 1mm apart. The chop sticks will stop the knife cutting all the way through the potatoes. Melt the butter in a small saucepan over low heat and add the minced garlic, cook for about 5 minutes. Place potatoes onto a parchment baking sheet ½ inch apart. Brush the garlic butter over each potato and season with salt and pepper. Bake potatoes for 15 minutes. Remove potatoes from oven and generously baste again with garlic butter. Continue to bake for an additional 10 minutes. Remove potatoes from oven and baste one last time. Top each potato with grated cheese and place potatoes back into the oven and bake for an additional 10 to 15 minutes or until potatoes are tender and cheese has melted. Lightly season each potato with more salt and pepper and finish with a sprinkle of chives.

Bacon-Wrapped Dates
Ingredients:
8 streaky bacon slices
16 dates
114 grams goat cheese
toothpicks



Preheat the oven to 180c. Slice the dates lengthwise on one side to create an opening. Remove the pit. Spoon a small amount of goat cheese into the cavity of each date and press the sides together to close. Cut the bacon slices in half. Wrap each date with a slice of bacon and secure with a toothpick. Arrange evenly on a baking tray and bake for 10 minutes. Turn and bake for another 5-8 minutes, until browned. Remove from the oven and let stand for 5 minutes before serving.





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
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On Saturday 19th October many friends, colleagues and acquaintances of the late Graham Campbell joined Graham's wife Helen and family in Stoke Fleming Village Hall for a celebration of his life. The sudden and unexpected news of Graham's death in mid-September was a shock to the community and brought great sadness, so it felt exactly right to come together and remember all the achievements of this talented and generous man over his whole lifetime.

Some of us knew Graham only as a diligent and caring Parish Councillor. He became a member of Strete Parish Council in 2016 and we soon knew that he had a passion for those in need. He strove to ensure that help and assistance was available to those who needed it from various charity organisations in the area. He was a kind person with a strong sense of social justice that underpinned his involvement with Dartmouth Caring and Citizens Advice. This became evermore important to Graham during the pandemic and the cost-of-living crisis.

However, during the Celebration, it quickly became clear to all present that the role of Parish Councillor was but one aspect of his many roles and achievements over the years. Contributions from so many friends and ex-colleagues told us all about his career in teaching, a period working as a craftsman carpenter and cabinet maker and as a trainer for young people to build a champion kayak team. Others spoke warmly about his extensive volunteering activities for social support networks, including Citizens Advice (where it is estimated that he helped more than 500 clients during his tenure) and with the TQ6 Community Social Partnership including Dartmouth Caring.


Graham's family and friends movingly recalled a spell spent living and working in France and his life-long passion for music, beautifully illustrated by musical contributions from fellow players. In short, he truly was a remarkable man.

In Strete Village, Graham arranged and oversaw all aspects of husbandry on the Village Green and Prideaux Lane on behalf of the Community. When the Strete Neighbourhood Plan was being formulated for the village, Graham provided unstinting support throughout its development. He also organised the purchase and fitting of a new roundabout in the Play Park. When the Kings Arms became a Community Pub, Graham stepped forward with his carpentry skills on several occasions to install and repair various timber structures in the garden.

I feel privileged to have known and worked with him on the Parish Council, a feeling that I know is shared by all members of the Council, past and present. Graham was a thoughtful and supportive member of the community and all residents will miss his dedication and commitment to the Village.

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



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
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In 1838, the first bottles of Lea & Perrins Worcestershire sauce were released to the general public and was the first type of sauce to bear the Worcestershire name. The origin of the Lea & Perrins recipe is unclear. The packaging originally stated that the sauce came "from the recipe of a nobleman in the county". Lord Marcus Sandys was well known for his love of food and even had his own book of recipes. Lea & Perrins of Worcester credit Marcus for the production of their famous Worcester Sauce. Legend has it that he travelled to Bengal and enjoyed the fish sauces so that on his return he asked John Wheeley Lea and Henry Perrins, dispensing chemists of Broad Street.

Worcester, if they could recreate it. Their attempt ended up inedible and it lay in the barrels fermenting and was abandoned in the basement. Looking to make space in the storage area a few years later, the chemists decided to try it again, and discovered that the long-fermented sauce had mellowed and was now palatable.

The use of similar fermented anchovy sauces in Europe can be traced back to the 17th century and fermented fish sauce called garum was a staple of Greco-Roman cuisine in the first century.



large handful of ice
100ml vodka
500ml tomato juice
1 thsp lemon juice
a few shakes
Worcestershire sauce
a few shakes
Tabasco
pinch celery salt
pinch black pepper

The precise recipe has been a secret, but an original 19th-century list of ingredients was found in a skip at the factory in 2009 and includes vinegar, molasses, sugar, salt, anchovies, tamarind extract, onions, and garlic and other ingredients which may include cloves, soy sauce, lemons, pickles, and peppers.

The first part of the production process involves maturing the sauce's key



ingredients in large barrels in the factory's basement for 18 months. The onions and garlic are packed into the barrels in malt vinegar, while the anchovies are packed in salt, soaking and maturing to take on the instantly recognisable flavour that makes Lea & Perrins different from any other sauce. Once the maturing of the ingredients is complete, they are brought together in a huge mixing vessel as part of the process before transferring to even larger vats for further maturing. Finally, the concentrated sauce is diluted and sterilised, ready for bottling.

Today, Lea & Perrins' famous sauce is exported to over 130 countries around the world, where it has become a much-loved staple in kitchens, restaurants, hotels and bars. It remains as popular today as it ever has been, and is still lovingly made in Worcester in very much the same way as it was when first sold in 1837.







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

MINUTES OF MEETING IN CONNECTION WITH THE SLAPTON LINE PARTNERSHIP HELD ON 19TH SEPTEMBER 2024 IN STRETE VILLAGE HALL

SLAPTON LINE PARTNERSHIP

CLLR GRAHAM CAMPBELL - INTRODUCTION

GC explained who made up the Slapton Line Partnership (SLP). A379 Slapton Line (SL) considered by residents to be a vital connection. Alternative routes require major adaptations. Other routes are not practical alternatives for the volume of A379 SL traffic. SLP have been meeting for a number of years and their purpose was to supervise and plan the protection of the SL and look at alternative routes in the event of SL being breached. The last meeting was in March 2024 and the next meeting has not vet been arranged. At the last meeting there were discussions about the issues for protecting SL and a series of action points was agreed. Members of the group left the meeting under the impression that a new strategy would be moved forward. Dan Field (DF) at SHDC was meant to co-ordinate how the strategy would be put in place. GC contacted DF for an update and was advised that nothing has been done. The second action point was road improvements of alternative routes. Three parish councils put forward their proposals for routes that could be upgraded. Six months ago John Fewings and Josh Mannings came to Annual Parish Meetings and went through their proposals. Nothing has happened since. If we wait to improve the roads after the A379 SL is breached, works to increase and widen passing places will cause further problems for traffic. Local residents were told that a planning application was going to be put in for works for the protection of the SL. Funding is needed. There is a dispute as to whether DCC received £6million funding already. No one has been given the sole purpose of managing the SLP strategy. There is no focal point. An adaptations manager was appointed but left. Seven months ago a councillor was tasked with preparing a job description for the role of adaptations manager. Nothing has been done.

CLLR JULIAN BRAZIL - UPDATE ON DEVON COUNTY COUNCIL POSITION

JB shared that after the last realignment the landowner said further works could not come any closer to the ley and therefore there was no option for any further improvement. This was compounded by the location being a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), which prohibited any attempts to protect SL

that used foreign materials. After progression stopped for some time Anthony Mangnall (AM), the then MP started moving plans forward.

Plan to save Slapton Line

A plan was proposed to put forward a planning application to install similar defences to Landmarks pioneering cage and large local stone system at Beesands. It was anticipated that the planning application would be refused but this would give AM the go ahead to challenge the SSSI designation (due to the site already having a tarmac road). DCC were responsible for submitting the planning application. When questioned in advance of today's meeting DCC advised they did not have funds to apply for planning. SHDC were meant to look at whether they could obtain funding from the environment agency but so far there was no progress to report.

Plan to prepare for temporary closure of Slapton Line

A plan to adapt the existing road network and to add additional parking either side of SL was proposed to run alongside plans to reinforce SL. The plan also highlighted the recommendation to encourage residents to ensure the services they rely on are on the same side of the line to where they live.

JB believes that friction between the two sides – save SL vs adaptations contributed to the appointed adaptations officer leaving the post. JB would like to see the two sides work together and see the value of both views.

LL has organised a meeting on 4th October to move the SLP action points forward.

CAROLINE VOADEN MP

CV stressed her recognition that this is a live issue, especially heading into winter. CV met with Dan Field of SHDC today and SHDC are looking to appoint a new adaptations manager. CV feels that the most pressing issue is to move forward with the adaptations before they are needed. Adapting the roads after a closure of SL will cause chaos. CV is very keen to move this forward. DF gave CV the impression that he was not optimistic that funding could be obtained to protect the whole length of SL.

PH added he was under the impression that planning was to protect a small stretch of SL that was identified as a specifically vulnerable part and JB wants the planning application to be put forward as soon as possible to get the road redesignated and to open funding avenues.

CV queried DCCs plan to ask the Environment Agency (EA) to fund a planning application that the EA will then reject. JB confirmed that this is indeed the proposal but there are different departments with the EA and added that he does not understand the objection when it is not at present a natural sandbank. It already has a tarmac road sitting on it and it is important to remember sensitivities over the subject of coastal erosion.

People are still concerned that there should be compensation for the irrevocable damage caused to the natural movement of the bay when they removed shingle for the Plymouth dockyards.

QUESTIONS FROM THE FLOOR

A member of the public, who was a former councillor, voiced frustration that he was working on this project twenty years ago and some of the people at the council are foot draggers with no motivation and it keeps going round in circles.



Cllr Peter Hadley discussed the national benefit of the site and, as it will need to be paid to be repaired anyway, it makes no sense not to invest in it now.

A member of the public added that the strategy published in November 2022 was based on not protecting SL and highlighted that it is concerning that in a developed country we are unable to keep our infrastructure properly maintained.

A member of the public raised concerns over the practicalities of increasing traffic, especially large farm vehicles on the lanes following DEFRA pushing farmers into using bigger machinery. He added that concentrating on adapting the lanes will spoil the area. In the 1960s when SL was breached the council workers were out in days and the road was reopened within weeks.

Cllr Jane Abbey voiced that when representatives from DCC came to a meeting to discuss improvements of the back roads they advised that DCC had already made adaptations on the alternate routes but they were unable to say where. They gave the meeting attendees the impression that they believe the current roads are adequate for any anticipated increase in the volume of traffic should SL be breached. Cllr Abbey also expressed concerns that the proposed passing places do not appear to be in the correct places.

CV supported Cllr Abbeys assertion. When CV spoke with DF he did not know where the money was spent but CV agreed to try and find out.

Cllr Crowson voiced concern that when SL was breached the last time there were difficulties in reaching vulnerable people in the rural community. He recounted how on several occasions his wife, a local GP who was visiting patients at home, had got stuck in mud at the side of the road where she had pulled over to allow vehicles coming in the other direction pass. Cllr Crowson highlighted the aging population and how the closing of the A379 SL will impact care of people in the community.

Cllr Tim Moseley commented that, each time SL closes, people focus on the north south routes and added how vulnerable the area is to other issues that can cause road closure such as wall collapses.

Cllr Cumberlidge felt the enormity of the businesses who rely on SL is not voiced enough and he is also concerned how it impacts the emergency services ability to get to people.

A member of the public queried the objectives of the environment agency in preventing the planning application from being passed. JB explained that the SSSI designation prevents foreign materials been used on SL. He reiterated the role of the refusal of the planning application was to allow the objection to the contradictions that, as there is already a road there, it calls into question whether DCC are relying on the SSSI designation and the Environment Agency as a reason for not funding.

CV understands that this is a heavily used and strategic route and wants to obtain supporting data in the form of counts of vehicles using the road out of the main holiday season.

Cllr Peter Hadley asked how much the planning application would be.

JB commented that he does not believe it to be very much.

There were no further questions and Cllr Ralph Clark closed the meeting.





We were delighted to welcome Liz Westcott a local Beekeeper from Brixham who proved to be a prominent expert on everything to do with bees. She is Chair of Torbay Beekeepers Association. Liz brought along many products from her hives for which she has won many awards at agricultural events. She has for many years run the Bee Tent at Devon County Show.

Liz gave a fascinating talk on the Life of Bees with the aid of excellent slides. We learned so much about different types of bees. It seems there is only one Honeybee which has actually evolved from a wasp. In fact, we were assured that wasps are good for our gardens as in early summer they eat all sorts of insects being carnivorous. It is only in late summer that they are looking for other things to eat such as our picnics — so wasp traps are fine then as they will die at the end of the summer anyway!

Bees are clearly remarkable creatures with a special hairy body to capture pollen on flowers with clever sacs on their thighs to store their plunder. Too many facts were presented for this report and the description of their remarkable mating habits had perhaps best be left for a separate article elsewhere!

But here are a few facts for you although my pen may not have captured them accurately:

- A Honey Bee nest or hive will have a workforce of at least 20,000 bees in springtime to pollinate crops and orchards.
- Bees are valuable to agriculture and the environment. Anything that must be pollinated in spring relies on Bees.
- In 1900 in the UK there were one million colonies yet today we have only 230,000 with virtually no wild colonies.
- A hive can have 60,000 workers in summertime with one Queen Bee.
- The Queen lives 4-6 years and lays 2000 eggs a day in May and June.
- Honey has been found in the pyramids and is still perfectly good enough to eat.
- The sun is 93 million miles away and takes 8 minutes to reach planet earth. Sunlight shines through green cells in plants to produce energy.
- Bees collect pollen/nectar from those plants and process it back at the hive to produce honey.
- So ripened honey is liquid sunshine!
- Without the Queen Bee the world would have no food.

Liz closed her talk by reading one of her delightful poems from her book. She is certainly a lady of many talents. Members enjoyed viewing and buying products from the hive. Tea and biscuits were kindly provided by Rita Mansfield and Janet Fairchild closing an enjoyable sociable afternoon.
