If you want work doing in your home or garden please consider the following advice:







- · Don't agree to work offered by unsolicited doorstep callers.
- · Don't rely on posts or recommendations on social media sites without doing your own research.
- · Don't be swayed by glossy flyers or impressive websites as they may not show the trader's own work.
- Don't pay cash or agree to be taken to the bank or immediately transfer money before any work is started.
- · Don't be rushed into making a decision.

### Do:

- · Get three written quotes from reputable businesses.
- · Research the companies you're looking to use e.g. ask for references and look online.
- · Ask friends and family to recommend local traders or search via Buy with confidence
- · Decide who to use in your own time and make sure you have confidence in their skills and abilities.
- · Ask to see professional qualifications, public liability insurance and if applicable waste carriers licence.
- · Make sure you have full contact details for a tradesperson not just a mobile phone number.
- · Check if you're entitled to your 14-day cooling-off period

If someone knocks on your door and you are not sure, don't open the door.

If you are concerned someone is at risk, always call the police.

If you are concerned rogue traders are operating in your area, always report it.

If a company claims to be working with a local council, contact the local council yourself to check this is true.

If you have concerns, or have any information please contact Trading Standards or police by phoning 101, if possible, please make a note of any descriptions and vehicle registrations seen.

Please phone 999 if immediate/or a crime is taking place.

Please pass this information on to neighbours.

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
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
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Prior to the invention of the compass, directions at sea were determined by the position of celestial bodies. Navigators had found their way using the sun and the stars. In the northern hemisphere, seafarers would use the North Star (Polaris) to show the direction of north helping them to navigate across the seas. This technique of course had substantial limitations, as it was only of any use at night, with clear skies.

The history of the compass started more than 2000 years ago during the Han dynasty (202 BC – 220 AD). The first compasses were made of lodestone, a naturally magnetized stone of iron, in Han dynasty China. It was called the "South Pointing Fish" and was used for land navigation by the mid-11th century during the Song dynasty (960–1279 AD).



A wind vane, weather vane, is an instrument used for showing the direction of the wind. It is typically used as an architectural ornament to the highest point of a building.

The word vane comes from the Old English word fana, meaning "flag".

The oldest known references to weather vanes date from 1800-1600 BCE Babylon, where a fable called The Fable of the Willow describes people looking at a weather vane "for the direction of the wind.

Around 48 B.C., Greek astronomer
Andronicus created a weather vane.
The Tower of the Winds is an ancient
octagonal tower made from marble
situated in the Roman Agora in Athens.
The first weathervane - also called a
"wind vane" - was fashioned to look like
the Greek god Triton, who had the head
and torso of a man and the tail of a fish.





The frieze under the roof of the tower features the eight wind direction deities.

- North ~ Boreas North East ~ Kaikias East ~ Apeliotes
- South East ~ Eurus South ~ Notus South West ~ Liva
- West ~ Zephyrus North West ~ Skiron


On early compass roses, the eight major winds can be seen with a letter initial above the line marking its name, as we do with N (north), E (east), S (south), and W (west) today. Later compass roses, around the time of Portuguese exploration and Christopher Columbus, show a fleur-de-lys replacing the initial letter T (for tramontana, the name of the north wind) that marked north, and a cross replacing the initial letter L (for Levante) that marked east, showing the direction of the Holy Land.




"Flavio Gioia or Gioja, also known as loannes Gira Amalphensis is reputed to have been an Italian mariner, inventor, and marine pilot. He has been credited with developing the sailor's compass, perfecting it by suspending its needle over a wind rose design with north designed as a fleur-de-lys, and enclosing it in a box with a glass cover.



The biggest challenge raised by the compass was what we now call magnetic variation: the angular difference between geographic or "true" north and the magnetic north, or the direction in which a magnetized needle points. Under clear skies, mariners could find the geographic north-south axis for comparison with where the compass pointed by either referring to the polestar or looking at the sun at noon. Beginning in 1698, with the support of England's Royal Society and the Admiralty, Edmund Halley, who would later be named the Astronomer Royal, set out on several long expeditions to measure Earth's magnetic variations across the northern and southern regions of the Atlantic Ocean. This data offered great advantage to the English Navy. In 1701, Halley produced the world's first isogonic chart, which shows how the angle between magnetic north and true north varies at different points in the Atlantic Ocean.



Viking-age vanes mentioned in the Icelandic sagas indicating that vanes have been made for longships.



A wind vane, weather vane, or weathercock is an instrument used for showing the direction of the wind. It is typically used as an architectural ornament to the

highest point of a building. The word vane comes from the Old English word fana, meaning "flag". Weathervanes have been around for over 2,000 years, invented by the Greek astronomer Andronicus in 48 B.C. to determine the direction of the wind.

The world's oldest existing weathervane is a Weathercock and is the Gallo di Ramperto or Rooster of Ramperto, is made of copper sheet and originally gilded and silvered. It was made about the year 825 on commission from Bishop Ramperto to adorn the top of the bell tower of the church of Saints Faustino & Giovita in Brescia.



It is reputed that Pope Gregory I had previously said that the cock (rooster) "was the most suitable emblem of Christianity", being "the emblem of St Peter". The Bayeux Tapestry of the 1070s depicts a man installing a weather cock on the roof of Westminster Abbey.

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

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
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### Café, Lounge and Restaurant

### Notes from a Teams Meeting with Matt Barrow, Connecting Devon and Somerset (CDS)

12 Noon 18th Dec 2024

### Present

Apologies from Ralph Clark who was unable to attend and Slapton Parish Council who were unable to provide a delegate at short notice.

### **Purpose**

CDS is charged with the delivery of the national broadband installation programmes to the residents and business of Devon and Somerset on behalf of Devon and Somerset County Councils.

The meeting aimed to provide an opportunity for CDS to discuss the recent 'Out of Scope' announcement of the Airband contract for Broadband provision in rural areas, the reasons for this and the effects it would have upon the affected Parish Clusters 272 and 273.

Finally, to review the way forward to ensure that the Parishes taken out of scope are not disadvantaged.

### Discussion

The meeting opened at noon.

MB opened by explaining that there were currently two government projects in train to deliver Broadband nationwide to rural areas and specifically the rural areas of Devon and Somerset.

These are:- The (now somewhat superannuated) Superfast programme, focussed on bringing up to 100Mb/sec connection speeds to communities by installing new fibre connections to new infrastructure (green cabinets) in the villages and hamlets, leaving the final connections to the premises to be via the existing copper telephone wire connections. This arrangement provides an approx 80Mb/sec connection for premises immediately beside the green cabinet which is attenuated by distance due to the final copper connection – typically down to about 30Mb/sec at a distance of 1.2 km from the cabinet. The newer Project Gigabit programme, whose aim is to provide up to 85% of the population with a 1000Mb/sec connection by Dec 2025 and as close as possible to 100% by 2030. Launched in the Spring of 2021, this is to be achieved by upgrading the fibre network and replacing the final copper connection to individual properties with fibre – Full Fibre to the Premises (FFTTP)

MB explained that the Airband work scope contract issues related solely to the Superfast programme. Phase I of Superfast had been implemented by BT Openreach some years ago, with most population centres in the two counties being provided with new green cabinet infrastructure and fibre connections., including the villages of Strete, Blackawton and Slapton. Over 320,000 people across the two counties have been connected in this way.

#### Airband and the Failure of the CDS Airband contract

Phase II of Superfast was intended to deal with the more rural small groups of premises and properties and individual houses, all of which pose a much greater challenge in terms of cost and commerciality for operators, and which would only get connected with the aid of government support. CDS tendered competitively and let a long-term contract to Airband, an Exeter based communications company, against a defined work scope inherited from BT. The contract between CDS and Airband was a standard contract written by Central Government, dating back to 2012, and made no allowance for inflation with time. The Airband work scope for our three Parishes had been lumped together and was known within the Airband contract as 'Cluster F23'.

At the beginning of 2024, Airband announced that it was stopping the network build work on the contract because it was losing money. In April it made 190 staff redundant and announced that it was restructuring. At that time, CDS entered into negotiation with Airband to try to salvage as much of the outstanding work scope with the aim of getting it completed within the existing arrangement. CDS did not communicate this to the outside world (commercial confidentiality?) but did eventually manage to persuade Airband to complete 9,000 of the outstanding 37,000 connections in the workshop. This left 28,000 connections to be taken 'out of scope' of the Airband contract, which unfortunately includes the whole of Cluster F23. Interestingly, Cluster F22 which includes the rural areas of Stoke Fleming down towards Blackawton will continue within the 9,000 connections rescued. Finalisation of this contractual arrangement for Airband to finish off led directly to the CDS announcement to Parishes in November. Many other rural areas in the South Hams are also affected by being taken out of the Airband Scope. ST asked MB to confirm that Airband had been paid based upon connections completed, and therefore with the work scope not fully completed, a proportion of the original Superfast funding remains unspent. MB replied that this was the case, although it was currently not possible to transfer Superfast funding into the Gigabit project.

CDS believes that the underlying cause of Airband's failure to complete was contractual, in that the contractors on these follow-up Superfast rural contracts (and there are others) progressively lost profitability with time, and there were no contract provisions which would allow any additional form of funding, modification or allowance for inflation.

NB Author's note There is also the possibility (not discussed in this meeting) of inefficiencies and wastage in contract management and handling – after all, the contractor squeeze situation was foreseeable for a long period of time prior to the eventual collapse. This will be for the respective County Councils to determine.

#### Possibilities for the Parish rural areas Looking Forward

MB described to us how Project Gigabit (which is much newer than superfast has been set up with separate central government funding to Superfast. It is centrally run and overseen by Building Digital UK (BDUK), a UK Government Agency within the Dept of Science and Innovative Technology. In contract to Superfast, the BDUK organisation controls its own contracts centrally.

Theoretically, all three Parishes will qualify for Project Gigabit upgrades, but the concern is generally centred more around what will happen with rural premises, rather than the villages and hamlets with existing fibre infrastructure. BDUK will run their own procurement services and have intimated that they will implement here sizes of contract:-

Type A, intended to serve up to 40.000 premises, with no lower limit on size.

Type B for 40,000 to 80,000 premises.

Type C for notionally 80,000 to 500,000 premises – with a typical contract at the upper end worth around £800k.

With these in place as sole suppliers for a given area, population could be added over time via call-offs on these contracts. Currently it is expected that South Hams, Teignbridge, Mid Devon, East Devon, all of Somerset – exc. South Somerset – North Somerset and B&NES will now go forward into a Type C Call-Off (Call-Off 4), with confirmation of this build expected in December 2024. It is possible that the Cluster F23 work scope taken out of the Airband contract could be incorporated into a separate call-off in Giga bit. It is just too early to say yet.

Not surprisingly, CDS believes that a larger number of smaller Type A contracts administered locally would be more appropriate for rural areas like the South Hams. They believe that there are only two organisations in the UK capable of implementing a Type C contract – BT Openreach and Virgin, and the Type C contract strategy is clearly angled to suit them. There is also a further possibility for premises not covered by either Superfast or GIS contracts, BDUK continues to operate a voucher scheme whereby communities or providers can apply for funding to connect eligible premises in a specific geography, with the current subsidy value set at a maximum of £4,500 per premise. This allows communities to organise their own shared arrangements on a micro basis, with perhaps a number of rural properties geographically close to each other able to fund their own connection. CDS can assist with formulating and arranging this, although the voucher scheme is currently paused until the Gigabit Project for South Hams is announced and tendered, in order to avoid duplication. There are a number of small contractors in the South Hams area who are interested in providing this service.

ST asked about the accuracy of the data used to define the Airband work scope and where it had been derived. There are clearly veracity issues with the data and some anomalies.

ST also asked whether Fibre was still considered to be the correct answer in rural environments – other possibilities exist such as fixed wireless, satellite, mobile. MB replied that all of these other methods had downsides compared to fibre and are not currently approved, but the picture is rapidly changing. For commercial reasons, manufacturers of alternative solutions have tended to concentrate upon connection speed rather than range, which makes them less suitable for rural solutions where distance to base is a big factor. Fibre is considered to be a 'generational upgrade' which is likely to suit the nation's needs for the foreseeable future and provides a solution which is likely to be easily upgradeable beyond that, so fibre is the preferred solution.

Decommissioning of the copper network is important in order to reclaim and reduce the metal used, and also important to reduce operating power costs – the copper network is electrified 24/7 and is this thus energy inefficient and less sustainable than fibre. #### **Devolution – January 2025**

Before Christmas, the Labour Government and Angela Rayner published their English Devolution White Paper, alongside their National Planning Policy Framework changes, and the Local Government Finance Settlement. It sets out plans for **compulsory** local government restructuring and **imposing** 'strategic authorities' across England.

In current two-tier areas, this would involve districts and county councils being replaced by unitary council(s), alongside a combined authority (preferably with a mayor).

#### Key point

We should not allow government to dictate to local councils how they operate now or in the future. Councils represent local people and they must come first in local decision-making. Taken together, this is a recipe for taking responsibility away from local communities and making local government less responsive to the needs of local taxpayers.

This is likely to result in higher council tax, rural communities being kicked yet again, whilst underperforming councils are given handouts without public service reform.

The Localism Act 2011 is existing legislation that empowers local people to make decisions affecting their local community. Regional government was abolished years ago, red tape on local councils has reduced (though more is needed), local councils have been given more control over local planning along with enhanced accountability. Control has been decentralised down to the lowest level: making it easier to create parish councils, letting parents create new free schools and giving residents power to protect their locality through neighbourhood planning.

Unitary restructuring must be locally led and have local support.

#### State control

Local areas are likely to be forced to adopt a new "Strategic Authority". Planning powers will be determined by these bodies. They could levy a new precept on council tax. They could work alongside new nationalised quangos. The Standards Board and the Audit Commission quangos are, allegedly, being resurrected.

The current attitude on devolution is reflected in new planning reforms: waging war on the countryside whilst cutting house building in the cities; failing to champion the freedoms gained from leaving the European Union; and gagging councillors on Planning Committees. The so-called 'Grey Belt' reforms explicitly remove the Green Belt requirements of "safeguarding the countryside from encroachment" and "assisting in urban regeneration, by encouraging the recycling of derelict and other urban land".

#### Proposed stance on restructuring

Invite 'proposals' from councils for local government restructuring; this could result in county council elections in May 2025 being cancelled.

However, for such a monumental decision local councils have been offered a ridiculously short timescale to get those proposals in. No council should be bullied or blackmailed into local government restructuring. It should not be imposed by top-down Whitehall diktat. Any changes should be local decisions, made by locally elected representatives after listening to views of local people. Devolution must be about local decision-making.

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#### **A379 Slapton Line Protection Funding**

This article reveals where Devon County Council has prioritised its support for Highway Improvements in Exmouth. Work to extend a stretch of Devon road to provide a "congestion-busting" scheme has started in Exmouth.

The scheme will see Dinan Way in Exmouth extended by about 830 metres.

A council spokesperson said the work, aimed at beating traffic delays, was expected to be completed by the end of 2025 and had been made possible by £15m government funding. Devon County Council Chairman John Hart said: "This extension itself may not be that long,

but it has the potential to be transformational for Exmouth and the wider area." Work on a two-metre wide shared path along one side for pedestrians and cyclists has already started. David Reed, MP for Exmouth and Exeter East, said: "It's fantastic to see this vitally important project get underway". After decades of campaigning, Exmouth's missing link road will be finally complete and will give our town much improved transport flow. Councillor Joe Whibley, Chairperson of Exmouth Town Council, added: "The town council is delighted, as this important infrastructure project should provide a respite from heavier traffic in the town and make life easier for those visiting and living here". Where does the protection of the A379 Slapton Line fit in Devon County Council's lobbying priorities for government funding to get this underway. Local residents have been pursuing action to protect this vital route for decades. Despite the anguish of the majority of residents, businesses and visitors at the potential loss of this approximate two mile stretch of highway in South Hams that provides a vital link between Dartmouth and Kingsbridge, there appears to be little appetite from parliamentary and local authority






